Operative Mortality in Resource-Limited Settings.

The Experience of Médecins Sans Frontières in 13 Countries

(Arch Surg. 2010;145(8):721-725. doi:10.1001/archsurg.2010.137)

A retrospective cohort study of 17 surgical programs in 13 developing countries by the humanitarian organization Médecins Sans Frontières showed that surgical care can be provided safely in resource-limited settings with appropriate minimum standards and protocols. About 20000 procedures were recorded.

Comment:

It is eye-opening that many surgical procedures can be performed with fairly good quality under hygienic and technical conditions which many surgeons and anaesthetists in our big hospitals would judge "primitive". Therefore a study is needed to investigate the minimum standards for hygiene in ambulatory surgery. Perhaps health services can save considerable sums by reducing hygienic procedures to evidence-based standards. *Jost Brökelmann (Germany)*

News from national organizations

VI. National Congress on Ambulatory Surgery- APCA (Portugal)



The Portuguese Association of Ambulatory Surgery (APCA), member of the IAAS, organized its VI . National Congress from 10 till 12 May, 2010, in Beja, Portugal.

National Health Authorities and well-know international and national speakers made this scientific initiative a very successful meeting for the 450 participants. The Portuguese Health Minister had the opportunity to recognize the great development of day surgery programmes that has occurred in Portugal in the recent years. From 75,935 of day surgery procedures in 2005, Portugal increased to 175,612 in 2009, which

represented 22,0% and 44,4% of all non-emergent surgery in 2005 and 2009, respectively, and a two-fold increase in 4 years time. This increase was registered all over the country, after the implementation of the governmental proposals in 2008 in order to promote more and more day surgery in the country.


Portuguese Health Authorities aim to reach more than 50% of scheduled surgery on a day basis in Portugal, by 2010.

During the Congress, the new President of APCA, Dr Carlos Magalhães, presented a lot of initiatives to the APCA associates. Consensus conferences, national registration of day procedures, implementation of clinical indicators in several DSU, monthly newsletter, and the creation of different subcommittees are among his projects.

Jan Eshuis, the Secretary of the Dutch Association of Day Care & Short Stay (NVDK), member of the Executive Committee of the IAAS, was one of the speakers invited to the Portuguese Congress. The next national meeting will take place in Braga, on May 2012.
